Bob Leich emailed a reflection on **Hartwig Moss**: "I saw in the "YAM" that our fraternity brother Hartwig Moss had passed away in January. I didn't keep up with "Harpo" over the years but prior to our 45th Reunion in 2005 we had a long telephone catch up. I was planning to call him later this year to work on him about the upcoming 50th but alas, that is not to be. Just another example as to why one should do things when they can and not... "put it off until later." The two of us coached a New Haven inner city basketball team one year composed of 13-15 year old black kids, stopping on the way back to the Yale campus at one of the many nightclubs in that area". Fred Roberts sent an article from the Harvard Gazette on **Henry Hacker**. The article had a presumptuous byline, typical of Harvard taking credit for Yale graduates: "*This is one in a series of profiles showcasing some of Harvard's stellar graduates.*" "Hacker, now 71, also collected a bachelor's degree at Yale University and a J.D. at Cornell. Now he is getting his third sheepskin,

a master of liberal arts (A.L.M.) in museum studies from the [Harvard Extension School](#). In 2008, after 40 years in or near New York, and with his three children grown, Hacker partly retired and moved to Cambridge, easing a transition back to the classroom. Back then, he asked himself, “What would I do if I don’t go to school? I don’t play golf.”

Bob Hammond forwarded a New York Times article on Judge **Barrington (Danny) Parker**’s recent decision on Argentina’s debt. The implications for sovereign debt and international finance are a little above my level, but I liked the way the Times characterized the Judge’s decision: “from the way Judge Parker would put it. “We believe,” he wrote, “that the interest — widely shared in the financial community — in maintaining New York’s status as one of the foremost commercial centers is advanced by requiring debtors, including foreign debtors, to pay their debts.”

It saddens me greatly to report the loss of another classmate, especially so close to the 50th. **Rod Drake** died on June 24th after a battle with pancreatic cancer. Rod is survived by his wife Jacqueline and sons Philip and Stephan. A memorial service was held on July 2 in New York, attended by a large number of Yale classmates. Rod was one of the “Blind Nine”; a group of roommates with whom many of you are or were acquainted. The remaining eight were all in attendance, serving as ushers and delivering a touching combined eulogy: **Sid Bass, Alan Corey, Mike Dominick, Clint Kendrick, Dennis Holahan, Seth Hoyt, Barry Preston, and Jonathon Ingham**. The Chapel at the The General Theological Seminary of the Episcopal Church was filled to overflowing. Rod’s son Philip has provided a video of the service which will be posted on the class website.
